Athens State University now proudly offers a Master of Science in Global Logistics and Supply Chain Management. This program of graduate coursework began with the Spring 2016 semester, and was built upon the base established in 2010 when Athens State began offering a bachelor's degree in Logistics and Supply Chain Management

The Master of Science in Global Logistics and Supply Chain Management from Athens State prepares graduates to manage the flow of goods, resources, and information from its origination to a final destination that meets the needs of both consumers and/or suppliers. Our graduates will be well positioned to serve industries and organizations that hire logistic and supply chain professionals.

Athens State provides its graduates with the critical understanding of global logistics and supply chain management including planning & strategy, operations management, system analysis & modeling, global trade, and economic development. This training gives students a competitive advantage in both the public and private sectors to land a career path within the nation's leading organizations.

Starting with the fall semester of 2016, the Master of Arts in Religious Studies program is designed for any individual interested in the academic study of religion. This program is non-denominational and provides individuals an opportunity to learn about Religious Studies in a neutral setting. Any student interested in the serious study of religion is welcome. The M.A. in Religious Studies program is designed to promote learning, critical thinking, and research in an open and honest environment.

Students may choose either a thesis track or a non-thesis track. The thesis track will prepare those students interested in pursuing doctoral degrees in religious studies or employment in research-related careers. The non-thesis track is for students who are not planning on additional graduate work but need to improve their opportunities for employment in a related field.

Starting with the fall semester of 2017 a Master of Education in Career and Technical Education degree will be offered. This provides a distinctive program to address the emerging need for practitioners and occupational trainers with knowledge specifically in Career and Technical Education, especially as it relates to the latest educational teaching and occupational training practices.

Athens State University's enabling legislation states that the University shall offer strategic graduate programs that avoid duplication of programs offered by other state universities and colleges and serve to enhance the institution's commitment to adult learners.

REPORT: ATHENS STATE UNIVERSITY IS FISCALLY SOUND

Athens State University's financial health is good and the institution is being managed in a fiscally sound manner, according to recently released financial reports.

The reports, compiled by Robert Toutkoushian, professor and economist at the University of Georgia, and Athens State accounting faculty, Josh Zender and John Berzett, focused on identifying financial indicators and comparing those to indicators of other similar institutions. Dr. Toutkoushian's report focused primarily on overall financial resources and distribution of those resources, costs, and student pricing as well as salaries. His report indicated that, although highly dependent on tuition and fee revenue compared to other revenue sources, the University's tuition and fee rates were lower than those of comparator institutions. The supplemental report from Zender and Berzett examined financials for the past seven years and found that the University maintained healthy ending net position reserves, experienced favorable financial trends, avoided massive reliance upon a single external funding source, and received no significant audit findings. The reports were shared with the University's Board of Trustees.

"These reports along with our annual audits show the University is on strong financial ground and that we compare very favorably with other institutions of like size," said University President Bob Glenn. "The reports confirmed our belief that Athens State is doing well but they also identified areas that we need to monitor to maintain this strong position."

The authors compared Athens State to "peer" institutions which were comparable in size, mission, and budget. Based upon the financial statements and data analysis and review of audit reports, the researchers could find no evidence of any immediate threats to Athens State's ability to endure over an extended period. In fact, the University's financial condition was stronger than several of its peers.

The Zender and Berzett report noted that the University's overall financial condition has improved since 2013. It also noted that the institution's financial position met or exceeded its peers for 62 percent of the financial indicators evaluated. Additionally, the long-range trend for over 66 percent of the financial indicators measured is favorable.

Mike McCoy, Vice President for Financial Affairs. "We believe these are areas where we can evaluate our business model and make changes to improve our operating efficiency."

The report also found that the University's debt load of \$18 million was at a sustainable level, but advised that the institution should carefully review the impact of issuing additional debt. The University most recently issued debt of \$5 million towards construction of Phase II of the Alabama Center for the Arts.

"I intend to work with our Budget Advisory Committee to assist us not only with our annual budget process but also to participate in the development of the University's capital budgeting plan," said McCoy. "I believe this will help us further develop a strategy that will keep the institution on sound financial ground."

Zender and Berzett also suggested that the University create a financial dashboard of key indicators that could be followed regularly and used to further compare Athens State's performance with its peer institutions. Their report noted that Athens State should be encouraged to recognize that financial and performance benchmarking provides an opportunity to reassess goals and objectives, establish priorities, engage employees and students, influence performance improvements, and document the institution's progress.

"We really like the dashboard suggestion and believe it is a great way to keep our faculty, staff, students, and the public informed on the University's finances," said McCoy. "We'll go to work on identifying those key components as well as developing a format that is easy to follow and understand."

Auxiliary services was one area that was identified for caution. Currently, five of the seven auxiliary enterprise units operate at a deficit. Overall, auxiliary services faced an \$85,000 net operating loss for the 2014 fiscal year. While operating at a loss, the Zender and Berzett report found this to be manageable given the institution's total net financial position. Auxiliary services include the Center for Lifelong Learning, food services, coffee shop operations, vending, print services, student activities, and bookstore operations. "This is an area that we need to monitor closely," said

according to Dr. Bob Glenn, President of Athens State. "We are honored that he has agreed to join us as we seek to change the face of Alabama by changing the lives of its students."




ATHENS STATE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION DONATES \$293,000

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS OFFERING FAST PATH PROGRAMS

Athens State University has recently initiated the Fast Path program for select classes in the College of Business. The Fast Path courses are now offered through the University Center locations at Wallace State – Hanceville and at the Redstone Arsenal. The classes are offered in a blended format (some face-to-face coursework and some online). Each of the three sessions are offered once a week for a period of five weeks.

Courses at Wallace State – Hanceville include Money and Banking, International Business, and Management Decision Support Systems. Courses at the Redstone Arsenal include Introduction to Acquisition and Contract Management, Principles of Management and Leadership, ACM Pricing, Money and Banking, ACM Administration, and Operations Management. Any Athens State student with U.S. Citizenship can take courses at the Redstone Arsenal.

YOUNG ALUMNI PLAN TRIP

The Young Alumni Advisory Council (YAAC) at Athens State University is offering a trip to Tropical Costa Rica to students, alums, and the community scheduled for March 2017.

The nine day trip includes sight-seeing in lush forests with stunning waterfalls, rumbling volcanoes, and visiting the Costa Rican coastline. Explore part of the 20,000 acre nature preserve of Cano Negro on a riverboat adventure. Travelers will spend two nights in Monteverde's fascinating cloud forest, experience the forest canopy on hanging bridges, and explore San Jose's Plaza de Cultura and the National Theatre. BUSINESS STUDENTS: AN EGGS-TRAODINARY STUDENT PROJECT

Athens State University Associate Professor of Marketing and Management Laura Lynn Kerner likes things fresh. Fresh ideas, fresh methods, and fresh eggs. In her search for the latter, she stumbled across Goose Pond Farm and its proprietor, Charles Ritch.

"When I moved from Atlanta, I had a hard time finding the organic and free range products that I had become accustomed to," said Kerner. "I heard from a student about Goose Pond Farm in Hartselle and now I've been going and supporting them for years."

Kerner formed a fast friendship with Ritch and early last fall he asked if her students ever took on projects. She offered an opportunity to develop a marketing plan to her Marketing Principles class. They took it and ran with it. Kerner said, "It was near the end of the semester and the students were actually kind of pushed to do a proper job, but they were very enthusiastic and even visited the farm on many occasions."

Charles Ritch developed Goose Pond Farm in 1993 after a successful career in manufacturing. He was drawn to the project because of food allergies and health issues from which he had been suffering. He saw how the conventional food industry operated and quickly found out that that was not the way for his endeavor to go.

"We wanted to get back to a more natural system," remarks Ritch, "where you have actual animal husbandry and take

care of the animals."



Ritch was deeply concerned with the fact that animals were forced together and stand in, live in, and grow in an area they had contaminated. He wanted to see a farm where animals could thrive and would be available to roam and search for their food in a more natural way. It has proven to be a very profitable and successful business venture.

When Ritch initially started the farm, he had a good handle on his customer as he

was one of the few businesses with healthy offerings in the area. He realized later that the new generations of consumers have more choices. In an attempt to get his message out to those new consumers, he was going to have to try innovative ways of reaching them. With a limited staff, he knew he would have to figure out a way to create a marketing plan quickly in an attempt to rescue those customers. That's when he remembered Laura Lynn Kerner and that she was a marketing professor at Athens State.

Kerner remembers the first trip to the farm with her students. "They jumped right into it, visiting the livestock, riding the farm on a flatbed truck, seeing what it was all about," Kerner said. "There were around 12 students and almost all of them are still keeping an eye on the farm and its success."

The students were charged with coming up with a marketing

plan for the farm and seeing what Ritch could capitalize upon and where he may need to enact some change. Kerner was very proud of how the students responded and "they knocked it out of the park." Ritch agrees.

Ritch said, "I was completely blown away by the professionalism of the students and how they tackled the project. I could not have asked for a better group or better feedback. It all worked."

One of the advantages about the student experiences learned at Goose Pond Farm is that not only do they give students hands-on field work, literally, but it is also something they can add to their resume to begin their job search. This is critical to those who may be entering the workforce with no actual career experiences. Lindsey Brown is a senior graduating in August. She was one of the dozen students who took Goose Pond Farm under their wing.

"I was interested in the promotional aspect of the venture," she said. "How he was going to sell his product was very interesting to me as I hope to be a pharmaceutical representative after graduation."

The students learned the basics from Kerner, but they also learned from each other, and from Ritch. Brown explained that each student had very different points in the project and it was interesting when all areas came together for the final presentation.

Ryan Donovan was also a member of the class and states that the project rejuvenated his passion for marketing. He had originally been a Logistics major but after this class, which is required for all College of Business students, he changed his major to Marketing. "Even though all of my past experiences had been in marketing and sales I was trying something new," he said. "The class made me second guess my pathway and I went back to what I originally planned."

Charles Ritch realized that his business needed a plan to keep up with his competition and Athens State had students willing to help. The friendship he first developed with Laura Lynn Kerner went on to become a working relationship with her, and a learning experience that students will not forget.
