














Onward ever!

ATHENS STATE SIGNS MOU WITH **WALLACE STATE**

thens State University and Wallace State Community College have signed a Memorandum of Understanding designed to help Wallace State students retain prior learning assessment (PLA) credit when they transfer to Athens State after completing their associate degree.

Students who receive PLA/CPL credit are more likely to successfully retain and graduate than the general college and university population. Many institutions in the state of Alabama are encouraging students to take advantage of learning that is acquired outside of the classroom; however, because PLA/ CPL does not transfer, students have been faced with a choice between not receiving credit they have earned, taking classes they already received credit for, or going through two or more lengthy and costly PLA reviews when they transfer from their community college to a university.

ATHENS STATE'S BSN PROGRAM RECEIVES CCNE ACCREDITATION

The Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) has announced that Athens State University's Baccalaureate Degree Program in Nursing has been accredited by the CCNE Board of Commissioners for five years, the maximum allowable for initial accreditation.

Officially recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education as a



national accreditation agency, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) is an autonomous accrediting agency, contributing to the improvement of the public's health. CCNE ensures the quality and integrity of baccalaureate, graduate, and residency/fellowship programs in nursing.

CCNE serves the public interest by assessing and identifying programs that engage in effective educational practices. As a voluntary, self-regulatory process, CCNE accreditation supports and



encourages continuing selfassessment by nursing programs and supports continuing growth and improvement of collegiate professional education and nurse residency/fellowship programs.

"Obtaining national CCNE
accreditation for the baccalaureate
degree program in nursing
indicates a program of quality,
excellence, and academic rigor,"
said Dr. Mark Reynolds, Chief
Nurse Administrator at Athens State
University. "It is a truly historic time
at Athens State and I am excited to

Athens State's RN to BSN program provides a pathway for success to registered nurses already working in their field to complete their baccalaureate degree in nursing. The program provides studentcentered learning experiences in a supportive environment to prepare registered nurses to assume leadership positions, manage complex clinical care, and improve the health and welfare of the individuals and populations within their community and across the nation. It also prepares the registered nurse to be a professional health care practitioner,

who provides compassionate and ethical care, which is based on research and scientific evidence, and who serves the dynamic health care needs of the individual patient, family, community, or population, and the health care environment across the lifespan.



er mother's illness inspired Carrie Trousdale to pursue a nursing degree at Athens State University and go into the medical field, determined to be a nurse who shows her patients compassion and care.

"My mother is a Type I diabetic, and she was in and out of the hospital so much and you can see the difference that the nurses truly make and that can be a positive or a negative," Trousdale said. "I've seen several nurses who are just not very nice and not very compassionate, and also nurses who you can tell love their job, they love their patients, and they want the best for their patients."

Trousdale, 28, from Danville, was in the first graduating class of Athens State University's new Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree which started fall 2021. She started the program in October 2021 and graduated in the spring with a 4.0 grade point average.

Trousdale said good nurses make a difference in their patients' lives and health.

"I wanted to be that compassionate, caring nurse, to give the best possible outcome to my patients," she said. Trousdale wants her

patients to know "they are not just a number, they were not just a patient, I was there to make them better."

Trousdale became a registered nurse in 2018 after completing an associate's degree at Wallace State Community College. There she was awarded the 2018 Health Science Excellence Award and the Nightingale Award, which is given to a student who shows care and compassion for patients.

The Athens State program, Trousdale said, was more advanced than the one at Wallace State. She said clinical reasoning and clinical judgment were taught more in the bachelor's program than in the associate's program.

"It really makes you think about why you're making these decisions for these patients rather than just following orders," Trousdale said. "You're also kind of thinking on your own. You're being more autonomous."

A bachelor's degree in nursing has helped Trousdale recognize the importance of getting all the facts.

"We really talked about not jumping to conclusions," she said. "You collect more information, you put it all together. Just a lot more clinical reasoning."

Trousdale got a job in 2018 working for Dr. Roger Moss Jr. at New Decatur Clinic and worked there for about a year before working in the emergency room at Decatur Morgan Hospital for about a year

and a half. Ultimately, she returned to work for Moss in 2020 and has worked a total of about four years at New Decatur Clinic, Trousdale said her work in the ER taught her many skills that have helped her become a better nurse.

"Now I know how to respond to emergent situations as well," she said. "So, if something emergent were to happen in the office, I know how to quickly respond."

Trousdale said she returned to the clinic because she prefers preventive care.

"I like being able to keep the patients out of the emergency room, prevent medical exacerbations," she said. "Keeping their diabetes under control, keeping their high blood pressure under control so they don't have to end up in the hospital."

Trousdale said she feels she has made a difference in her patients' lives and health.

"I try my best to get to know my patients on a deeper level rather than just a nurse-patient relationship," she said. "I want them to trust me and know that I'm here for them."

Moss, a primary care physician, said he nicknamed Trousdale "Sunshine" due to her demeanor.

"She's always cheery and she makes my patients feel that way," he said. "She has a lot of compassion for the patients and she's an excellent nurse."



Moss said Trousdale is a benefit to his practice.

"I wish I could keep her on, but I think she wants to move up to other things," he said.

Trousdale said she enrolled at Athens State because she wants to pursue a doctoral degree in nursing and become a nurse practitioner.

"I plan to do the dual enrollment program at (the University of) Alabama; I actually just applied there as a psychiatric and family nurse practitioner," she said. "It is a longer course of study, but once I'm finished, I will be certified in psychiatry and family care....I'm going to study both, and I will just go wherever my heart leads me."

Trousdale said she realizes it is a lot to take on and has been told by people to slow down.

"It's kind of how I've always done things," she said. "I'm a little nervous about it but I think I can do it."

Like Athens State's nursing program, Trousdale's courses from the University of Alabama will be online. She said she will be able to complete her clinicals at local hospitals.

Trousdale is married to Robbie Trousdale. They have three children, and she is expecting another. She said she has worked while enrolled at Athens State and it has been hectic.

"Typically, I will take my kids to school early in the morning. I come to work, I do school work on my lunch break," Trousdale said. "Pick the kids up from school, get all their stuff done, put them in bed. Then I do school work most of the night."

Trousdale said after attending Athens State she is even more committed to improving her nursing skills.

"Just getting my bachelor's has already made me a better nurse," she said. "I want to keep improving and continue to educate myself as far as I can possibly go in order to give my patients the best possible care."

The Master of Fine Arts in Integrative Design (MFA) program is a professional terminal degree in art and its disciplinary extensions of graphic design and digital design. Students will have the opportunity to choose between three areas of concentration: Media and Digital Arts, Painting and Drawing, and Ceramics.

"We are excited to launch our MFA in Interactive Design," said Dr. Lee Vartanian, Interim Provost & Vice President for Academic Affairs. "This new program, based in the Alabama Center for the Arts, will provide a compelling option for innovative, next generation artists to receive a terminal degree in the fine arts. Our MFA student artists will explore exciting new territory,

including digital, multimedia, and virtual reality—areas not traditionally seen within the fine arts. I can't wait to see the amazing projects and pieces our new MFA students will produce. They will make our physical and digital world more visually interesting and engaging!"

INTERNATIONAL Women's Day

thens State University celebrated International Women's Day on March 8 with an International Women's Day Breakfast on campus.

International Women's Day (March 8th) is a global day of celebrating the social, economic, cultural, and political achievements of women while reinforcing a commitment to women's equality.

The celebration was held in the Sandridge Student Center Ballroom and featured breakfast and keynote speaker, Lilly Ledbetter. Ledbetter was the plaintiff in the United States Supreme Court case Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. regarding employment discrimination, setting off a wave of change and opening a dialogue across the nation.

"Panel with Pizzazz" was held after the keynote, providing a chance

for attendees to learn alongside each other as panelists discussed a number of different issues, what keeps them motivated, and how anything is possible with the right support network.

This year's panel included Donna Coleman, LaJoy Johns, Bailey Lee, Vishwa Parikh, and U'Meeka Smith (moderator).

The 3rd Annual International Women's Day Celebration is scheduled for Friday, March 8, 2024.

About Lilly Ledbetter:

For more than a decade, Lilly Ledbetter fought to achieve pay equity.

It was here in Alabama, where Ledbetter was born and raised, that she began a crusade that would eventually lead her all the way to the nation's capital.

In 1979, Ledbetter took a job at the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company in Gadsden, Alabama.

Although she was the only woman in her position as an overnight supervisor, Ledbetter began her career earning the same salary as her male colleagues. By the end of her career, however, Lilly was earning less than any of the men in the same position.

Although she signed a contract with her employer that she would not discuss pay rates, just before Ledbetter's retirement an anonymous individual slipped a note into her mailbox listing the salaries of the men performing the same job. In spite of the fact that Ledbetter had received a Top Performance Award from the company, she discovered that she had been paid considerably less than her male counterparts. Ledbetter filed a formal complaint with the Equal Employment

Opportunity Commission and later initiated a lawsuit alleging pay discrimination. After filing her complaint with the EEOC, Ledbetter, then in her 60s, was reassigned to such duties as lifting heavy tires. The formal lawsuit claimed pay discrimination under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Equal Pay Act of 1963.

Although a jury initially awarded her compensation, Goodyear appealed the decision to the U.S. Supreme Court. In 2007, the Supreme Court ruled on the Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. case, In a 5-4 decision, the court determined that employers cannot be sued under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act if the claims are based on decisions made by the employer 180 days ago or more. Due to the fact that Ledbetter's claim regarding her discriminatory pay was filed outside of that time frame, she was not entitled to receive any monetary award.

Since that decision, Ledbetter has lobbied tirelessly for equal pay for men and women. Her efforts finally proved successful when President Barack Obama signed the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act into law on January 29, 2009. Ledbetter said of her continuous and persistent efforts, "I told my pastor when I die, I want him to be able to say at my funeral that I made a difference."





Meet Zachary Griffin, a graduate from Athens State University's College of Business and recipient of the Outstanding Recent Graduate Award from the Athens State Alumni Association. Griffin began his journey at the University in the Fall of 2020. What began as a purely academic endeavor, grew into a thriving and well-rounded campus experience for Zachary Griffin.

Along his way, Griffin realized he needed a change in his chosen field of study and attributes his personal and professional growth to the faculty and staff at Athens State.

"The staff in the Career Development Center were instrumental in assisting me find my academic and personal strengths," said Griffin. "It became clear that the management program in the College of Business was the perfect fit."

Griffin graduated with a bachelors degree in management and a minor in human resources management in December of 2022. Today, he works as the human resources generalist and business operations analyst at Mission Multiplier, a cybersecurity business based in Huntsville. Alabama.

As an Athens State Student, a pivotal decision that launched Griffin into a successful campus experience was

"taking the leap" to become involved in various student activities. The first step Griffin took was applying for the Athenian Ambassadors. At the start, Griffin recalls being uncertain of student activities truly being a worthwhile investment of his time. Little did Griffin know that his involvement in the Athenian Ambassadors would be the catalyst to developing his love for connecting with peers, mentors, the community, and the University.



Griffin's involvement on campus steadily increased as he became the Head Athenian Ambassador and Director of Student Relations for the Athens State Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM) Student Chapter. Griffin even made several appearances as Hebrew the Bear.
