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
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

ACADEMIC SEARCH, INC. TO ASSIST WITH PRESIDENTIAL SEARCH ACADEMIC SEARCH

The Athens State University Board of Trustees has retained Academic Search, Inc., to assist with the upcoming Presidential search. With a mission of providing the highest level of service to clients and assisting in enriching the pipeline of potential leaders for higher education, Academic Search has worked exclusively for nearly 40 years in searches for presidents and senior administrators in higher education.

Senior Consultants of Academic Search, Mr. John Garland and Dr. Eric Richtmyer, visited campus on November 14 & 15 to meet with members of the campus community and the Search Committee. The role of the consultants is not to select the next President but rather to support the Search Committee and to help ensure that the search and selection process is managed effectively. This will be beneficial in ensuring the best leader possible is secured for the future of Athens State University.

The Athens State University Board of Trustees has appointed Interim President Dr. Ron Ingle as the Chair of the Presidential search committee. Other committee members were both elected and appointed from various University and community constituencies. The search committee membership includes representatives from the local community, the faculty, staff, and students of the University, as well as representatives from the Alumni and Foundation Boards.

Academic Search, Inc. will begin advertising the position in early December with a deadline of early February 2019 for full consideration of applications. Semi-finalists' interviews are anticipated to occur in late February 2019. Campus visits for finalists are expected to occur late March, with the appointment announced mid-April.

The Board of Trustees welcomes presidential nominations by all members of the Athens State University community.

PLANTING SEEDS or Success

AN INTERVIEW WITH MR. JERRY NEWBY

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I believe that I received a good education when I was at Athens. All of my family feels that way. Athens State University means a whole lot to the Newby family. It has helped us to grow and be successful.



Growing cotton is second nature to long-time farmer and Limestone County native Jerry Newby. His family has a long and storied history in Athens, dating back to the 1800s. Farming runs deep in the Newby family – seven generations deep, to be exact.

Jerry has had a successful career focused around farming; he served as the president of the Alabama Farmers Federation and Alfa Insurance from 1998 until 2012. Once part owner of Newby Farms and a long-time farmer, he has seen firsthand the impact of technological advancements and innovations that have revolutionized the farming industry. From planting and picking cotton by hand to operating equipment that can plant and harvest multiple rows at a time, farming has changed a lot over the years.

As Jerry looks back at his life and his career, he is thankful for the opportunities that have come his way

and also for the people who have helped make it all happen. A focus on education has been apparent throughout the Newby family, especially when skills can be directly applied in real-world environments. work Jerry's family has a rich history in earning an education while working their way through school, particularly at Athens College, now Athens State University. However, Jerry's connection Athens State goes even deeper, as his parents met and fell in love during their time on the historic campus, and Jerry, along with many other members

of the Newby family, have followed in the tradition of attending the institution.

ALL IN THE FAMILY

Jerry's father, James M. Newby, completed high school in 1939. Unable to pay college tuition, he worked on the family farm the first year he was out of high school to save enough money to enroll at Athens College. His college career began in the winter quarter of 1940. During that time, the Methodist Church (who operated Athens College at the time) had purchased a hosiery mill in Decatur to allow students to work their way through school and pay their tuition, which James took advantage of.

Jerry's aunt, Mary, was also enrolled at Athens College during this time, and his mother, Martha, (Mary's sister) enrolled in the fall of 1940, both from Columbia, Tennessee. They both chose to attend Athens College because it was a Methodist institution. During her time on campus, Martha worked her way through school as the on-campus mailer, distributing mail to the campus offices and dormitories and delivering the mail to and from the local post office. She graduated with a degree in education in 1944.

James M. and Martha got married at First Baptist Church, the home of the current First Baptist Church Family Life Center. "They were both 22, and Daddy had been away with the Army. He arrived in town, they got married, had dinner at the old Ross Hotel where they were staying, and at 4:00 AM the next morning, the newlyweds were headed to Texas where he was stationed with the Army. He was stationed in California prior to his deployment in the European Theater," says Jerry.

Once James shipped out to Europe, Martha returned to Columbia, Tennessee. Jimmy, Jerry's brother, was

born in 1945; once James successfully completed deployment, they moved to Athens. Jerry was born in 1947, and his mother began teaching Limestone County. His father completed his business degree from Athens College in 1948. He built a country store that he operated in Sardis Springs. "Daddy was a farmer, a business owner, and a family man. He eventually became a public servant and served on the Limestone County Board of Education. Later he was elected tax assessor and probate judge of Limestone County," says Jerry.



Jerry's love for farming began at an early age. As Jerry and his brother Jimmy matured and grew, they worked on the dairy farm and then they started "working a little cotton." His father gifted a percentage of the crops to each son to encourage them to have a vested interest in the farm. At this time, the farm was operated by Jerry's grandfather, father, brother, and himself. In 1963, they purchased their first one-row cotton picker, and after graduating high school in 1966, Jerry, along with his father and brother, formed James Newby and Sons Farm.

The belief that a college education was beneficial was instilled early on by his parents, and they strongly encouraged them to go to college. They spoke frequently about their love for Athens College, the memories they had together there, and how an education helps make sound decisions in business dealings and in life. After graduating high school, Jerry started taking basic education courses

at Calhoun Community College; having a stake in the farm, Jerry knew he wanted to stay close to home when completing his education. He enrolled at Athens College and began studying business, as farming is a business that requires the same knowledge, processes, and considerations as any other retail operation.

Jerry graduated from Athens College in 1972 with his business degree. He later became very involved in the Alabama Farmers Federation. His leadership began with an innocent conversation with the man who was in charge of the Young Farmers who felt that Limestone County needed to have a division of the Alabama Farmers Federation, so a meeting was held to discuss. "Five couples and myself were in attendance. All the men there had a wife but me, and they wanted us to make a decision whether we wanted to have a division there. The County President of the Federation said that the County would support it. A vote was taken, and it was agreed that Limestone County would participate. They needed a chairman, and since everyone had a wife except me, they nominated me: and that's how I became chairman."

Jerry is quick to point out that while he has found success in his life and business dealings, it was not solely due to his own efforts; it takes a lot of hard work by many different people. "The only way to be successful is to work together," says Jerry. "This is especially true in a farming operation. I've been very fortunate to have people surrounding me that have helped me get to where I am today. I feel very blessed."

GENERATIONS OF ATHENIANS

In all, eight members of Jerry's family have graduated from Athens State (Jerry; his wife, Dianne; his parents, James M. and Martha; his aunt, Mary; his brother, Jimmy; his nephew, John; and his daughter, Elizabeth). "I believe that I received a good education when I was at Athens," says Jerry. "All of my family feels that way. Athens State University means a whole lot to the Newby family. It has

helped us to grow and be successful." He also said that Athens State University means a great deal to the city of Athens and surrounding areas. "I think Athens State University can give a person a new lease in a career, in life in general. Athens State University has the programs that people need, and they can get a good education here at an affordable cost - the lowest in the state of Alabama and one of the lowest in the country. Athens State University has the ability to touch people's lives to make their lives better." Jerry continues, "I have had friends that have come to Athens and have graduated at 55 or 60 years old, and it changed their lives for the better. I think one of the things that a college education does for you is that it gives you confidence. You had to work to get that degree; it gives you confidence that you can be successful." As the top university in the state of Alabama for non-traditional students, Athens State focuses on providing educational opportunities to learners of any age.

PLANTING SEEDS

Any good farmer knows that before you can step back and admire your crop, you have to plant the seeds. You have to put a lot of work into nurturing the crop, protecting it along the way and providing the resources needed to allow it to reach its full potential. Much is the same for young students, aiming for the stars but needing a bit of guidance along the way. That's why the Newby family feels strongly about giving back to the community, especially students pursuing a quality education. The family has endowed six scholarships that provide opportunities for Athens State students each year, directly impacting student success.

Jerry and his wife, Dianne, have three children, Elizabeth, Mary Anna, and Jerry Allen. They all grew up on the Newby farm, and Elizabeth is a 2007 graduate of Athens State. Jerry no longer has a hand in the business operations of Newby Farms, but farming will forever be in his blood. "I really liked farming. I loved farming. And I still do," he says.

ATHENS STATE RANKED #1 IN ALABAMA FOR NON-TRADITIONAL STUDENTS

Athens State University has been named one of the best colleges and universities for non-traditional students in the state of Alabama by College Factual's 2019 rankings. Ranked #1 out of 21 schools in Alabama, Athens State was recognized as "the best college in the state for returning adults and other non-traditional students." The University has upheld this ranking for the past two years.

Non-traditional students are those who fall outside the "norm" of typical student parameters; they are classified as those who attend school part-time, are over the age of 25, and/or are either attending school for the first time or returning after an absence. As the number of

non-traditional students continues to grow in college populations across the country, Athens State University is an ideal school to cater to these students' unique needs by providing affordability, quality, and a large selection of online courses.

On a larger scale, Athens State University was also ranked #37 out of 1,159 colleges and universities nationwide for non-traditional students. This puts Athens State in the top 5% of schools in the nation for returning adults and other non-traditional students seeking a valuable option for continuing studies that fit their individual ways of life.

Mr. Bill Jones, from Covington, Georgia, was named "Alabama State Fiddle Champion" at the 52nd annual Tennessee Valley Old Time Fiddlers Convention held at Athens State University October 4-6.

Jones won the title by winning the "fiddle off," which pits the top fiddlers from the junior, intermediate, and senior divisions, earning the Convention's top prize of \$1,200. Tyler Andal, from Nashville, Tennessee, finished runner-up.

The 2018 Tennessee Valley Old Time Fiddlers Convention was presented by Huntsville International Airport, with stage sponsorships by Alabama Farmers Cooperative and Aetos Systems, Inc. Other sponsors included Athens State University Foundation and the Greater Limestone County Chamber of Commerce. The Convention contributes to Athens State by funding student scholarships and University projects.

In response to the Office of University Advancement mailing CDs to members of the Class of 1968 that were a copy of an Athens Chorale record:

You cannot imagine the surprise of opening the mailing envelope and finding a CD of a record of which I have played the grooves off! I was a member of that choral group, under the direction of Harry Moon. In fact, I sang in the Athens Chorale almost the whole time I was a student at the College/University. Our rehearsal room was on the top floor of McCandless, and it was a wonderful space – skylights, etc.

Harry was a fantastic director! He pushed us to do really great music. Hard music. He expected perfection, and although that was often not attained, we came close, often.

A bit of "behind the scenes" behind the record of this body of work: I was a senior when this record was made. It was early May, 1968. We had to make the recording before several of our best singers returned "north." I would imagine some of those students, who had really wonderful voices, would not return to Athens. Some would. So, we had to get the recording done. We set our risers up in the middle of the gym, because of the acoustics. I don't know where Harry got the recording equipment, but Harry had to manage it before/after each song - that's why some of the endings of the songs were cut short. If you listen carefully you can hear birds in the background, chirping away. They could care less that we were making a recording. When we ended performing a song, we had to stand perfectly still so Harry could halt the tape recorder. Of course, we had to repeat some of the songs to get them up to Harry's standards. Some of the selections on the album/CD were recorded on site when we sang at First Baptist in Huntsville earlier in the spring term [trimester? . . . whatever it was that year . . . Admin couldn't make up its mind as to what we called the 'times' within the academic year . . . it WAS a mess!!] . . . Those selections sung at FBC were less 'alive' in my opinion. When the choir got through singing all the music Harry had chosen for the record, and we were leaving the hot gym, it was like a funeral. Those of us who were seniors would not be coming back that next fall. We would probably never see some of our fellow choir members again. We even thought we would never see Harry again, as he was migrating to Atlanta to direct the music program at Oglethorpe College. Some would never return to the campus. It was like a death.

It was a while before the actual 33 1/3 record was delivered to the choir members. It was like Christmas getting

the record [at least for me]. For a long time, I literally cried when I played the record; it was actually painful in some instances. Like I said, I've played the grooves off my record. "Cry Out and Shout," the first piece on the record is still, for me, THE most exciting piece of Christian musical literature I've ever sung. All the choir folks loved it. Each selection had a special meaning. "Madame Jeanette" was special to me because Jeanette Osterheld (Schuster) was a member of the choir and such a wonderful young lady. The group, The Jesus Mafia, we called it, I ran around with nick-named Jeanette "Mother Superior." We were, in those days, a lightly irreverent group!! So, to sing about our Jeanette was special.

So, all of those wonderful memories, and more, are wrapped up in this recording/CD. A real piece of Athens history!!

I have kept up with Jeanette through the years. We've been to several funerals of Athens College alumni. Jeanette and her sister, Kay, were at my wife's graveside funeral two years ago.

I was fortunate enough to reconnect with Harry that following fall in Atlanta. While I was attending Emory's Candler School of Theology, I volunteered to sing in the Oglethorpe College Chorale, which Harry directed. Then, he assumed the position of director of the Candler Choraliers, at Emory; a group of 20 select male voices, responsible for providing choral music for worship services in the chapel on Tuesdays and Thursdays. So, for the rest of my seminary career, I had the high honor to sing under Harry's direction.

And it all started at Athens College.

And I still love the record and play it often. Such wonderful, wistful, memories! So, I thank you, and the University, for sending this prized CD, which is such a part of my life and history.

ATHENS STATE RANKED TOP 20 IN NATION FOR MOST AFFORDABLE ONLINE ACCOUNTING PROGRAM

Athens State University has been named one of the most affordable online options for students to obtain a bachelor's degree in accounting. The University's online program was ranked #19 in the nation by SR Education Group in their 2019 Most Affordable Online Colleges for Accounting list and included in College Cliff's top 20 list of the best higher education institutions offering online bachelor's degrees in accounting.

Each college featured in the lists offers degree options that can be completed entirely online. The rankings represent "online schools across the nation that are committed to providing affordable, economical options for students." Tuition rates for each college were manually researched to determine the most affordable choices. Academic program features such as courses offered and financial aid options were also factored in.

Athens State University focuses on providing affordable, flexible, and high-quality options for all learners. Whether a student is full-time or part-time, Athens State offers a wide variety of online, in class, or blended course options to conveniently fit into any schedule.

Of those who win gold, only up to five are awarded the Award of Excellence – Outstanding Student Chapter. A monetary award of \$1,000 accompanied the Outstanding Chapter Award, and the club was recognized on stage during the event's luncheon.

While at the conference, Athens State's IMA Chapter also won a t-shirt design contest. Designs had to meet specific criteria, such as focusing on the Certified Management Certification (CMA). The prize included a monetary gift of \$500 for the club.
