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Athens State University Welcomes New President

When Dr. Bob Glenn resigned as President of Athens State University in July 2018, a long nationwide search process was employed to select the University's next President. The search involved the assistance of an organization called Academic Search, as well as an internal search committee and forums attended by facultv. staff. and students. Of the three final candidates who were brought to campus, Dr. Philip Way was selected as the 37th President of Athens State University. Dr. Way holds a Doctor of Philosophy in Industrial and Business Studies and a Master of



Arts in Industrial Relations from the University of Warwick and a Bachelor of Arts in Economics from Selwyn College, Cambridge University. He also completed the Frank Knox Memorial Fellowship and Visiting Fellowship at Harvard University. He previously served as Provost and Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs. as well as interim president, at Slippery Rock University in Slippery Rock, Pennsylvania. Dr. Wav has over 30 years of experience as a faculty member and administrator in higher education including at University of Cincinnati and University of Alabama at Birmingham. He and his wife, Cheryl, have been active in becoming acquainted with the University faculty, staff, and students since arriving on campus in August 2019. We wish them a long tenure at Athens State.

Dynetics Donation Promotes Programming



Last May, Athens State University's College of Business became the recipient of \$15,000 from Dynetics. The money is to be used toward its undergraduate and graduate-level Logistics and Supply Chain Management programs. In addition, Dynetics will offer one paid internship to an Athens State student each year.

The University was chosen, in part, due to the rising demand for graduates in the fields of cybersecurity and logistics and supply chain management in the Huntsville area. "The business environment continues to grow, and there is a need for logistics and supply chain management specialists. Athens State is preparing their students for those future careers, and Dynetics is definitely looking to fill positions such as these soon," stated Ronnie Chronister, Dynetics senior vice president of contracts and Athens State University Board of Trustees Chairman

College of Business Program Changes

The College of Business has received approval for some exciting program changes. On September 13, 2019, the Alabama Commission on Higher Education (ACHE) approved changing the name Information Assurance to Management of Cybersecurity Operations. In addition, a new certificate in Cybersecurity Operations began accepting students in Fall 2019. This is an important step in making the major more marketable and identifiable to the general public and potential students.

During the 2019-2020 academic year, Athens State University was notified of its ranking in several categories, some of which involved programs in the College of Business. In November, Athens State was ranked #19 in the nation by SR Education Group in their 2019 Most Affordable Online Colleges for Accounting. In May, Athens State University's online Bachelor in Human Resource Management degree program was ranked #7 in the nation by TheBest-Schools.org for its quality and types a new one-year track for completing a Masters in Global Logistics and Supply Chain Management. There are 30 semester hours (10 courses) in the program. When the Masters was first introduced, the courses were taught in a cohort format that started once every academic year in the fall semester. The courses were spread out over five semesters. With the new track, the same courses can be completed in three semesters. This is accomplished by offering most of the courses in a half-term option allowing students to complete four courses in the time it takes students in the traditional

of courses offered. The same organization ranked the University's online Supply Chain Management degree program #6 which was an upward movement of 6 spots from the previous year.

While rankings are somewhat misleading, it is good to know that Athens State University is getting noticed nationally for the quality we have come to expect from all our programs. It is up to all of us to continue to build upon that solid reputation.

Alabama. Auburn University placed 2nd in the competition which included teams from the University of Alabama, Auburn University-Montgomery, Columbia Southern University, Mississippi State University, and the University of West Alabama.

During the case competition, teams must analyze and solve a business case by preparing a 15-minute oral presentation that provides their consultative recommendations. Presentation rounds are judged on site by a panel of certified SHRM professional members and accomplished HR practitioners. "SHRM's Statewide Case Competitions offer a unique opportunity to apply in-class learning to real-world HR scenarios and showcase their knowledge to seasoned HR practitioners," said Susan Post, SHRM-SCP, east divisional director at SHRM. Members of the Athens State team were Jeremy Boles (Team Captain and Athens State SHRM Student Chapter President), Alethia Jordan, Brittany Grant, and Diana Woodward. The team was mentored by Dr. Gary Huckaby, HR Assistant Professor and Athens State University Student SHRM Chapter Advisor.

Athens State University Has a New Honor Society

In Fall 2019, Athens State University started a new chapter of The National Society of Leadership and Success (NSLS). The advisors for the chapter are Dr. John Berzett and Professor John Moore of the College of Business and Richard Collie, Coordinator for Student Inclusion Initiatives. NSLS is the nation's largest leadership honor society. Students are selected by their college for membership based on either academic standing or leadership potential. Students invited to their school's chapter have earned distinction with their nomination, but must complete the leadership program requirements to achieve induction. In order to become an inducted member, students must attend an orientation, a leader-

ship training day, three speaker broadcast events, and three success networking team meetings. Once these steps are complete, the student is invited to an induction ceremony.

Is NSLS worth it? The NSLS provides real benefits to help members on their own success journey. These include opportunities for all members and exclusive benefits for those who achieve induction. These benefits include scholarships and awards, a job bank, partner discounts and benefits, speaker broadcasts. success coaches, and more. According to the NSLS website, 85% of NSLS members transitioning into careers landed the job of their choice upon graduating and nearly 80%

of those students attributed their success to the NSLS's program.

At the current count, Athens State University has 188 students who have paid membership and are in the portal to achieve further steps toward post membership. This is a great start to what we hope to be a thriving new chapter at Athens State.
