institutional research, and strategic planning, including regional accreditations, new program development, and student recruitment and retention. Before accepting the position at Athens State University, Dr. Adair was serving as a Professor and Co-Director of the Computer Science and Business Degree Program at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.

Dr. Adair holds a Ph.D. in Finance from Indiana University, an MBA from University of North Dakota, and a B.S. in Computer Science from the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Outside of his academic positions, Dr. Adair has served as a business consultant.

Dr. Adair was a Commander in the U.S. Air Force 91st Strategic Missile Wing from July 1984 to July 1989, in Minot, North Dakota, where he was responsible for overseeing facility maintenance, operational maintenance, and security teams for 150 ICBM launch silos. Dr. Adair is happy to be "back in the South" where he has family, after many years living in various parts of the country.

OHSM Receives GSP® Designation

Athens State University's Bachelor of Science in Occupational Health and Safety Management (OHSM) has been reviewed by the Board of Certified Safety Professionals (BCSP) and approved as a Graduate Safety Practitioner® (GSP®) Qualified Academic Program (QAP), providing the program's graduates the opportunity to apply with BCSP for the GSP designation after graduation. The GSP meets the credential requirement for the Certified Safety Professional® (CSP®), the "gold standard" in safety certification, allowing those who hold the designation to waive the Associate Safety Professional® (ASP®) certification examination.

A GSP QAP is a degree program in

safety, health, and environmental practice that has been reviewed by BCSP and demonstrates a substantial match to the ASP exam blueprint. Any person having graduated from Athens State University with the B.S. in OHSM may apply for the GSP designation within their program's applicable dates.

Dr. John Wells, Assistant Professor of OHSM, has spent the last three years creating a dynamic Safety Management Program like no other in the nation. Dr. Wells states, "When we say our graduates are EHS man-

agers, we guarantee they can balance a budget, manage people, and navigate regulatory affairs!"

Aerospace Visits Cowart Elementary School

The

trio talked about their ongoing STEMSAT CubeSat project. Ms. Kennedy's students are establishing a tracking station to collect data from STEMSAT which is planned for launch some time in late 2023 on a Vaya Space Dauntless hybrid propulsion rocket.



ATHENS STATE STUDENTS TOUR POLYPLEX FACILITY



During the Fall 2022 semester, a group of Athens State students toured the Polyplex manufacturing facility in Decatur, Alabama. Dr. Kim Roberts, Dr. Mike Essary, and Dr. Cyndi Lovelace accompanied students in the MG 390 Operations Management course and the student chapter of American Production and Inventory Control Society (APICS) on the experiential learning tour.

Polyplex is among the world's largest producers of thin polyester film used in packaging food products and industrial applications. Students received an overview of the plant's operations and a guided tour through the process areas and warehousing area. Polyplex has facilities in India, Turkey, Thailand, and the United States. They are investing more than \$90 million in an expansion project at the Decatur facility.

Ms. Watwood is in her third year of service as an Accounting Club officer. She works as an auditor for DCAA (Defense Contract Audit Agency). Ms. Watwood received a plaque from IMA, and her winning manuscript will be published in the next issue of *Strategic Finance* magazine.

COB Hosts Guest Speaker

In January 2023, the College of Business hosted Dr. Marcus Ambe, Executive-in-Residence, and a renowned Procurement and Supply Chain Management Professional with ties to the African continent. Dr. Ambe is President of African Institute for Supply Chain Research (AISCR).

During Dr. Ambe's visit, he made a presentation to faculty and administration that proposed Athens State University hosting the AISCR. His presentation demonstrated how AISCR activities can be beneficial in fostering and pro-

moting the Athens State University brand as a hub for the supply chain programs. He also promoted the development of executive education programs to support U.S. companies sourcing or investing in Africa.

At the moment, there are over 600 U.S. companies with a presence in Africa. These companies battle with challenges of supply market intelligence, quality control, certification of suppliers, regulatory compliance, and port challenges.

Leaving a Legacy

When an institution has been around for over 200 years, it will have seen many individuals come and go. Athens State University has a storied history of several presidents who served under some trying times. Madame Childs was the president of the institution during the Civil War. She was purported to have saved Founders Hall from destruction by producing a letter from President Abraham Lincoln in support of the institution. Another president, Mary Norman Moore, served during a typhoid epidemic during which some students died. More recently, the institution's leadership had to make tough decisions during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The thing to remember about great leaders is that they cannot accomplish greatness all alone. They must have tremendous support from others around them. Someone has to be there to cook and serve the meals, clean the toilets and classrooms, file the student records, etc. One person cannot perform every function that is necessary to run any university.

There is a poem called "The Dash" by Linda Ellis that speaks of the time we spend on earth between our birth and death dates. In a similar way, many of us will be remembered by the dash between our hire and retire dates. Shouldn't we focus on being the type of employee that puts forth our best efforts to make the institution as strong and vibrant as possible?

As mentioned on the previous page, the College of Business has lost several retired employees over the past year. While they were here, each made great contributions to the institution. Some

worked on establishing new programs. Several served as faculty advisors, helping navigate students to a degree. Some served as club or honor society advisors. Others just provided needed support to those around them.

Some titles have more prestige (and the pay scale to go with it!) than others, but all jobs are necessary to keep the institution going. It is important to realize that everyone has a specific role and that they choose to perform their duties to the best of their abilities. That is how you can leave a legacy.

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
